



Overview

Outdoor education policies can <u>promote resilience</u> in children, including increased confidence, attention, and reductions in disruptive behavior. Outdoor education gets children outside, <u>reducing fear and anxiety</u> about environmental issues and increasing their sense of <u>personal responsibility</u> for their future and community.

Policy Options

- Outdoor Preschool Licensing: Licensing can support small businesses and nonprofits, increase access for lowincome children, improve safety, and make child care centers competitive for federal & grant funding. Washington <u>S.B.5151</u>, Oregon <u>H.B.2717</u>, Maryland <u>H.B.525</u> license or pilot licensing outdoor child care centers.
- Outdoor School For All: Outdoor learning grant programs can increase access to outdoor opportunities, especially for rural, small, and/or low-income communities. Georgia's (S.R.203) outdoor learning committee created an <u>outdoor learning grant</u> <u>program</u>; Maine (L.D.1817) and Washington (H.B.2078) created outdoor learning grant programs for schools.
- Outdoor Education in Curriculum: New Hampshire <u>S.B.266</u>, New Jersey <u>A.5313</u>, and New Mexico <u>S.B.289</u> create opportunities for outdoor education in state curriculum. Georgia <u>S.B.202</u> would establish an outdoor education pilot program to understand state need for outdoor facilities and curriculum.
- Green Schools: In addition to up to <u>\$64 per square foot</u> in cost savings, efficient ('green') schools offer real-world learning opportunities that promote outdoor learning. Maryland <u>S.B.383</u>/ <u>H.B.531</u> increases the number of green schools and annually evaluates the program's cost effectiveness; Maine (<u>L.D.612</u>) established a Green Schools Coordinator.

KEY POINTS

- Outdoor education can improve childhood health by reducing <u>nearsightedness</u>, reducing <u>vitamin deficiencies</u>, and increasing both childhood and lifelong <u>physical activity</u>.
- Outdoor education can improve academic outcomes by increasing academic achievement, school readiness, social and emotional learning, and reducing disruptive behavior.
- Outdoor education can build appreciation for local and rural heritage through immersion in time-honored outdoor industries, activities, and community resources.
